BJØRN ASHEIM
PROFESSOR
LUND UNIVERSITY, SWEDEN

Professor Bjørn Asheim is a major international figure in the area of Economic Geography. He holds the chair in economic geography at the Department of Social and Economic Geography at the University of Lund, having previously held the chair in human geography in the Department of Sociology and Human Geography at the University of Oslo. Professor Asheim is co-founder and deputy director of CIRCLE (Centre for Innovation, Research and Competence in the Learning Economy), a multidisciplinary Centre of Excellence in innovation research at Lund University. He is Visiting Professor at the Department of Geography at the National University of Ireland at Maynooth.

Asheim's research interests are in the areas of economic and industrial geography, and regional innovation research, where his specialisations include: regional clusters, regional innovation systems and learning regions; SMEs and innovation policy; globalisation, and the geography of the creative class. Asheim has served as an international expert for UNCTAD, OECD and EU. He coordinated the EU project on "SME Policy and the Regional Dimension of Innovation" and is currently coordinating the European Science Foundation project "Constructing Regional Advantage". In 2008-2010 Asheim will be one of the key experts in the OECD review of higher education in regional development.



RICHARD BARBROOK

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR UNIVERSITY OF WESTMINSTER, UNITED KINGDOM

In the early 1980s, Richard Barbrook was involved with pirate and community radio broadcasting. Helping to set up the multi-lingual Spectrum Radio station in London, he published extensively on radio issues during this period. Having worked on media regulation within the EU for some years much of his material was published in his 1995 book Media Freedom. In the same year, he became the coordinator of the Hypermedia Research Centre at Westminster's Media School and was the first course leader of its MA in Hypermedia Studies. In 2007, Richard moved to the Social Sciences School of the University of Westminster and published his study of the political and ideological role of the prophecies of artificial intelligence and the information society Imaginary Futures. Richard Barbrook is a founding member of Class Wargames and co-wrote the script to the group's film: Ilze Black (director), Class Wargames Presents Guy Debord's The Game of War.



CATHY GARNER
CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER
MANCHESTER: KNOWLEDGE CAPITAL, UNITED KINGDOM

Cathy has a background in international knowledge transfer, extensive experience of urban dynamics and regeneration, education and knowledge-based business development. In 2008 Cathy was appointed by the Secretary of State for Innovation, University and Skills to serve on the Strategic Advisory Board for Intellectual Property policy and in 2009, co-opted to join a Cabinet Office Innovators' Council. Cathy established an international charity to address the health needs of the global poor; and established and ran the Research and Enterprise Office at the University of Glasgow in Scotland. She has acted as an advisor in Canada and Japan on intellectual property and knowledge exchange and has served as a non-executive director on numerous public and private sector Boards. She is a Fellow of the Royal Statistical Society.

JAMES BRADFIELD MOODY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CSIRO, AUSTRALIA

James Bradfield Moody is Executive Director, Development at the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO), one of the world's largest and most diverse global research organizations. Moody is on the Advisory Council of the Australian Bureau of Statistics and a Board Member of the Brisbane Institute. He is an Australian National Commissioner for UNESCO, was previously co-chair of the UN Environment Programme Youth Advisory Council and Executive Secretary of the taskforce on Science and Technology for the UN Millennium Development Goals. He has been named Young Australian of the Year in Science and Technology and one of the Australian Financial Review's Young Executives of the Year. Moody received his PhD in Innovation Theory from the Australian National University, National Graduate School of Management and was Chief Systems Engineer for the Australian Satellite FedSat, the first Australian satellite to be launched in 30 years. He is the co-author of The Sixth Wave: how to succeed in a resource-limited world and is a regular panellist on the ABC TV television program The New Inventors

PROFESSOR AND DIRECTOR
SMART CITY FUTURES. UNITED KINGDOM

James is a Chartered European Engineer with specialisation in Design, Academic Enterprise, Human Communications and Team Building. His research areas include space and resource utilisation, design methods, the product introductory process, technology and knowledge transfer, multi-media for professional communications, partnering, cultural change, action learning, the information superhighway and simulation, including virtual reality. He was one time managing director of Britain's first commercial learning videodisc company and designer of the Menuhin Auditoria in Portsmouth. He was head of two very different university departments, architecture and manufacturing and engineering systems, a Deputy Dean of Technology and Dean of Postgraduate Studies before taking up the post as Director of Academic Enterprise responsible for Salford University's 'Reach Out' initiatives into industry, commerce, the service industry, the voluntary sector and society at large. For the past 30 years James has been researching into all aspects of communication and the mid-career education of professionals especially those in the construction industry. He has designed, directed and produced a number of national/European award winning multi-media learning packages. He has also been responsible for developing effective professionals' learning strategy based upon a fourfold model of learning.

Lucy Turnbull has worked for many years as a solicitor, principally in Turnbull and Partners Limited. Lucy chairs AXS listed WebCentral Group Limited and is director of Pengana Holdings Limited, a governor of the Woolcock Institute for Medical Research and a Director of the National Portrait Gallery. Lucy was Sydney's first female Lord Mayor (2003-4) and Deputy Lord Mayor (1999-2003), during which time she also chaired many council committees, including the Central Sydney Planning Committee, the Planning, Transport and Development Committee and the Finance and Audit Committees. She is currently Deputy Chair of the Committee for Sydney, a board member of the Redfern Waterloo Authority and an Administrator of Tweed Shire Council. In 1999, Lucy published Sydney – Biography of a City.



GLENN WIGHTWICK

CHIEF TECHNOLOGIST / DIRECTOR, AUSTRALIA DEVELOPMENT LABORATORY IBM. AUSTRALIA

Glenn Wightwick is an IBM Distinguished Engineer, Director of the IBM Australia Development Laboratory and IBM Australia Chief Technologist. From 2001 to 2006 he undertook a number of assignments in Shanghai, Tucson and New York in areas ranging from large scale system design to managing a team defining the architecture of IBM's enterprise storage subsystems. Since joining IBM in 1987, he has worked on the application of large scale Unix systems to the solution of complex problems in domains including computational chemistry, seismic processing, weather forecasting, transaction processing and highly-available infrastructure. He spent seven months working on RS/6000 systems to support the XVIII Olympics Winter Games in Nagano, Japan during 1997 and 1998, and was involved in the design. implementation and operation of the RS/6000 infrastructure to support the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games. Glenn has led numerous systems and software development projects, published a number of papers in the areas of Numerical Weather Prediction, Medical Imaging and the Internet, and is the author of eight patents. Most recently he was appointed an Honorary Professorial Fellow at the University of Melbourne.
